Sasquatch Searcher call blasting theory

It seems now that the standard practice now when doing sasquatch research is to call blast known or unknown sasquatch calls or other primate calls into the night time woods, some researchers say they are getting responses to these calls on some trips. But my experience on call blasting is mixed, I have not really had any luck doing it with only response that was getting were very far out, and those I believe it was responding to something else. Now we have had some response to tree knocking to some degree, something has knocked back in the same rhythm that we started with, but only once or twice.

Now our reason I think call blasting is not a good thing to do, we have found in our research area that call blasting will cause the local sasquatch population to go underground, tree knocking will get a soft response but if you keep it up they will leave the area, most of the time at this research site we usually get night time visitors during the night stealing or moving stuff around, or a few pin-cones tossed at the tent with the usual vocalizations, but on nights that we have called blasted we get nothing for days, no nightly vocalizations or tree knocking nothing at all, if we keep a quite and calm camp we get action in and around the camp area. I believe if a research group is new to the area you should not do call blasting until the very end of the trip, this due to the research and experience that we have found is that you will scare off the local sasquatch population that you are searching for.

We would suggest from our experience not to call blast until you have tried every thing else. The best way we found to get a response in my research area is to sit still and calm in a area that we have seen activity before, but then we spend lots of time in our area and have a good idea in a large area were they might be.

We guess if you are only going to be in a area for a couple days it does not matter if you scare the resident sasquatch off for a few weeks. And you might get lucky and get a response.

But if you have to call blast we would call in moderation in the short cycles and with low volume of the calls as well the amount of the calling.

Also remember we do not have a clue what the calling actually means to a sasquatch, for all we know we might be screaming run away danger at this spot, or you smell bad and to stay away, this might get a response from the resident sasquatch unless you sound more meaner and bigger than it is.

It is just that we have no clue on the language of the sasquatch, I have heard and a fellow researcher also has heard what I call a warning sound / cry. I only hear it when a large bear is in the area, and it comes from directions around the bear, it was like they were following it. I have

tried to make this sound a couple times when I actually see a bear, to my surprise I got a reply a couple of times, my fellow researcher and I was in camp when we heard this cry come from the forest edge, very Loudly I might add, we got out of the tent and found a large bear in the clearing right in front of the tent, I think they warning us that night.

So until we understand there calls, we should not call blast sounds or cries we have no clue what they mean, put out music for them, our group is have great results with this, we even get strange sounds back at us.

It even caused a incident we can not explain, we were using a bright blue radio to broadcast music out in a small clearing, we left it out a couple nights with no response so the next night we removed it and brought it to camp, we had a visitor that night, it stole the radio, this radio had a simple on off switch, and a large volume button. we heard the radio come on and very loud at that, we listened to it as it moved off thru the woods, we could hear it later from the ridge above us, we found it up there after we finally got up there resting on a rock, what hauled it up there who knows?

We have tried to broadcast other type of animal sounds at night to see what might respond to them, we tried turkey, duck, goose, elk, deer, moose, and other various varmint calls, we had some very strange results at times in our research area. We have had strange replies and some tree knocking, a couple of researchers had something try to mimic the calls, and we have heard the sounds weeks after we did the calling, it is strange to wake up to awful sounding ducks near camp, and you know there are no ducks in the area.

So for call blasting, we do not do it in the accepted standard style, and we don't believe that style works, for they are doing it on the assumption that they are dealing with a animal intelligence, I believe that Sasquatch are much smarter than simple instinct responses, we do believe you will get a curious response at times for the species are curious in nature. That is why we get responses to other types of broadcast-ed sounds.

Call blasting, if you are going to do it, do it with respect, and do not be afraid to try something new and unusual, for you might find the key to unlock some of the mystery of the sasquatch, the main thing is that researchers do all they can to try to understand the species, so lets go squatching.

As for equipment for call blasting, well it ranges from a good set of lungs to as much as you can afford, here at sasquatch searcher we take the low cost approach, less tech the better is how we approach our research, it is going to take someone with lots of luck or lots of time put into the search for sasquatch that is going to make a break-thru in sasquatch research.
